Geometric shapes and organic structures have been combined in a game of balance between the functional and the aesthetic. This year interactive, playful and irreverent objects go beyond functionality and transform design into a lively and emotional experience.



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6. Balancing Tables

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










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10. Square angles

Chairs and sofas are characterized by a design that forgoes soft, rounded curves in favor of **straight lines** and defined geometric shapes. This structured approach gives the furniture a firmer and more robust appearance, standing out for its minimalism and its ability to integrate functionality and aesthetics in a contemporary way. The sharp angles and flat surfaces

not only provide a **sense of solidity,** but also emphasize modernity and order, creating a contrast with the more organic forms traditionally associated with comfort.

The combination of simple shapes and clear volumetries makes it easy for the furniture to become the center of attention within any space, maintaining a balance between comfort and a strong visual presence.

12. Sinuous Wood

The trend highlights the use of wood in an innovative way, transforming it into a light and flexible material capable of creating soft and fluid shapes. This approach allows the material to curve and adapt naturally, drawing organic lines that bring dynamism and softness to the designs. Wood, worked more freely and without restrictions, conveys a sense of lightness and modernity, while maintaining the warmth and authenticity of a natural material.

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13. Fabric Accents

There is a new emphasis on textile and natural fiber details, used in elements such as chair backs, decorative accessories, bookcases and other furniture. These interweavings add a unique texture and handcrafted dimension that connects with the current desire to incorporate natural materials into interior design. Fabrics, especially those made from fibers such as jute, linen or cotton, not only add warmth and comfort, but also reflect a more organic and sustainable aesthetic. In addition, woven finishes create a sense of craftsmanship, evoking a return to traditional manufacturing techniques and a more natural and authentic approach to modern spaces.
